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Car Cleaning made easier...

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
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EXTERIOR

To clean your mirror blades, simply wipe them with a clean rag dipped in hot, soapy water. After you clean off the soap, wipe the edge of the blade with rubbing alcohol. That can help with reducing streaks on your windshield.

If you have dirty headlights you could try cleaning them with toothpaste. Simply rub toothpaste into the headlights with a toothbrush and watch the grime come right off. Spray warm water onto the headlight and wipe away the toothpaste with a cloth.



To remove bugs from your car, spray either WD-40 or cooking spray onto the windsheld or paintwork to loosen bugs. Then wipe clean with a cloth.

If you want your alloy wheels to shine, you just need water and washing powder. Make a paste out of the powder and proceed to rub it all over your car's alloys. Rinse off with water and your car will have shiny alloys that will make people jealous.

No need to break your back making those pesky hubcaps and wheel covers spin and spin. Simply remove them from your car and place them in the dishwasher. With little to no elbow grease, they will shine like new—just try not to wash them with your driver plates.

INTERIOR

Your cup holders can easily become a sticky mess. Not only is that annoying, but it might even harbor bacteria. If your plastic holder is removable, place them into the dishwasher for about 20 minutes. If you cannot remove them, warm soapy water and a good scrub will do the trick.



If you don't have removable cup holders and decide to try to clean out all the gunk that collects in the bottom, try putting plastic caps over the holes in the bottom of your cupholders. They're perfectly and one wonders for catching any crumbs or things that could potentially get stuck in there and are easy to clean in the dishwasher.

Plastic cereal containers are thin and small enough to make the perfect rubbish bins for cars. The snap-cover lid keeps the rubbish from falling out just in case it gets knocked over.

You don't need special tools to clean out tight interior areas. An old toothbrush or cotton buds are amazing for getting in all the nooks and crannies of the car and will be incredibly helpful in cleaning small spaces such as vents, seams, buttons, and switches.

The secret ingredient to super shiny dashboards is hiding in your kitchen - olive oil. If you use the same effect without the olive oil smelt, baby oil is a great alternative.

Go over with coffee filters to soak up any excess oil and get rid of any lingering dust.

By using a spray bottle of water and a sponge, you can also get rid of dust and dirt from your interior without too much fuss. By running the sponge along the upholstery, you can see the dirt coming off easily. After you have removed the dirt, use a vacuum to get rid of it permanently.

Even though most people never look up, dust collects above us as we drive. Unfortunately, a regular cloth will not do a thing for most car interiors. If you want to clean your car ceiling properly, invest in a microfibre cloth that will soak up the dust.

A can of Compressed air can be used to clean air vents, just push a can of air and blast all the particles out.

If you want to spruce up your car seats, lightly sprinkle baking soda, leave it for five minutes before vacuuming. Clean the instant freshness.

Throw your car mats in the washing machine to get them back to looking like new. We'll probably want to do it in a gentle cycle just to make sure the mats don't damage your machine, but they'll come out looking amazing!
