Put your thinking cap on and see if you can match the jobs to the characters, then strike a pose and snap a photo as one yourself!

While we tuck into pizza, burgers and chocolate, they scoffed down slimy, wobbly jellied eels! Hygiene? Optional. Food? Weird and sometimes downright disgusting. Can you see these vile Victorian foods on display in the kitchen, and guess which options on the menu the Montagu's actually ate?
