20 young drivers have received a classic car on loan, for a whole year, at a Hand Over Day at The British Motor Museum. The cars are part of the Classic Car Loan Project (CCLP) which is sponsored by BMM to encourage the next generation of classic enthusiasts.

Tom Caren, Show Manager at BMM welcomed the group and the drivers were congratulated, on being selected, by CCLP Ambassador Sarah Crabtree and special guest Victor Riley.

The cars, with various marques featured, range from the 1930s - including Austin 7, 1960s - Morgan to Triumphs, Morris Minor and Riley, 1980s - Morris Ital and Peugeot, to 1990's Rover and Ford Sierra.
